# End of The World: Climate & Policy

# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course will teach the essentials of understanding the quarternary time period in conjuction with the United States' policies towards the environment and climate. This course looks at landmark laws, extraordinary cases of environmental abuse as well as recovery, and we will look toward the future of climate and policy in the USA.

From protests to court cases, this course examine how politics, civic engagement, and the health of the environment have changed over time, and how these pieces will interact together in the future.

## WHAT TO EXPECT

You should expect to complete rigorous coursework that includes, but is not limited to: Reading scientific and scholarly articles regarding law and climate, thinking in a solutions-based manner, and distinguishing fact and theory from opinion and rhetoric. This class requires a significant amount of reading, writing, and discussion.
